TIPS FOR TEACHING ARABIC



Your time and effort are essential for your child to successfully master the Arabic language. To help your child learn Arabic:

- 1. Always speak Arabic at home.
- 2. Regularly practice Quran recitation with your child. This improves your child's pronunciation and enriches his or her vocabulary.
- 3. Be sure that your child pronounces glottal letters correctly. Remind him or her that it gets easier with practice.
- 4. Encourage your child to speak Arabic whenever possible, especially with friends and family. A helpful rule of thumb is: "Speak Arabic with Arabic-speaking people."
- 5. Never mix Arabic and English. If your child uses an English word in an Arabic sentence, verbally replace it with the correct Arabic word.
- 6. Always make sure your child's Arabic homework is completed and corrected before he or she turns it in. Help your child to understand and memorize all the new words he or she encounters in each lesson.
